1. Executive Summary

The **Research Management Cell (RMC)** successfully organized a multidisciplinary seminar dedicated to **Mini Research Proposal Presentations**. The academic event served as a collaborative platform for faculty members from the **Management (Mgt), BCA, and BSW** departments to showcase their upcoming research frameworks. A total of **seven scholarly proposals** were systematically presented and reviewed during the session. The program concluded with institutional guidance and encouraging closing remarks delivered by the esteemed Asst. **Campus Chief Dr. Hari Singh K.C.**

2. Objectives and Targeted Participation

The primary goal of this initiative was to foster a robust academic research culture within the institution by encouraging interdisciplinary collaboration. It aimed to provide a structured peer-review platform where faculties could receive expert critique before commencing their fieldwork. The event successfully engaged critical stakeholders across various departments, featuring:

- **Expert Evaluation Panel:** The SWSC RMC Chairperson, Mr. Bidur Dhungel, served as the lead evaluator, supported by the active attendance of **four core RMC committee members**- Mr. Rajendra Lamichhane, Dr. Shankar Kumar Shrestha, and Dr. Shipra Jha who monitored compliance and research quality standards.

3. Presentation Highlights and Discipline Breakdown

The core of the seminar featured **seven distinct research presentations** spanning diverse fields of study, ensuring a rich exchange of academic ideas:

- **Literature (3 Presentations):** Faculty members presented three distinct proposals focusing on textual analysis, cultural critiques, and linguistic studies.
- **Economics (2 Presentations):** Two critical studies were introduced, targeting financial structures, market mechanisms, and economic trends.
- **Food Security (1 Presentation):** A specialized proposal addressed the critical global issues [specially targeting Kathmandu, Nepal] of agricultural sustainability and resource distribution.
- **Social Work / BSW (1 Presentation):** One field-centric proposal focused on community welfare interventions and localized social challenges.

4. Outcomes, Expert Feedback, and Impact

The program generated immediate positive impact by elevating the institutional research baseline. During the open review session, the **SWSC RMC Chairperson delivered detailed academic feedback**, offering the presenters precise suggestions to refine their methodologies, tighten their data collection metrics, and clarify their research questions. This comprehensive review process significantly upgraded the quality of the proposals, ensuring they meet the standards required for official funding and academic publication.

The Mini Research Proposal Presentation program achieved its structural goals by bridging the gap between different academic departments through research.
